Shelter Manager's Report

This Fall was guite busy for CASA and with the burst of sunshine lately we can't ignore that spring is just around the corner. That is not only when bulbs sprout but also when the busy kitten season begins everywhere. The shelter is working tirelessly to prepare for the new little needy arrivals. Thanks to the hard work of the shelter staff and the understanding public, this episode was contained well and stayed manageable. The cats all recovered quickly and most were adopted in time to join families for the holidays.



Wilford's Story

It was a hot July afternoon when the County animal control officers showed up at the shelter asking for help to bring in a new impound dog. It took 5 people: 3 staff members and both animal control officers, to get the dog into the shelter. They carried him on a blanket and put him into the largest kennel available. Usually abused dogs are underfed and malnourished, not the opposite. This dog was so obese that he could not walk. The staff named this new dog Wilford.

The next day when the staff arrived for work they went straight to Wilford's kennel to check on him. There he lay wagging his tail and smiling (yes, dogs do smile). He appeared to just be happy not being stuck outside in the exhausting heat with all of his extra weight. The staff had to sling a towel under his belly and lift his back end up to support him while they helped him walk outside to relieve himself. Wilford would run out of breath after only a few short

Staff was concerned that due to Wilford's obesity he might have underlying health issues, but blood tests they administered came back normal. The staff carried him back out to one of their cars and took him to the vet for an exam. When Wilford was examined he weighed 142 pounds! He was supposed to weigh around 60 to 65 pounds. 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

Wilford's back legs and hips so he was started on antiinflammatory tablets. He was also immediately started on a diet of frozen green beans, low fat cottage cheese and vitamin supplements. Surprisingly, he loved it! Thanks to the generous support from our wonderful community members, the shelter received donations of green beans and cottage cheese for Wilford to eat along with monetary donations on his behalf. Wilford seemed to improve a tiny bit each day.

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To encourage Wilford to get up and move around, the staff would dance around his kennel and sing funny songs. He seemed to enjoy their funny antics and would bark and howl at them as he got up, joined in, and headed outside with them. As time went on, Wilford stayed in the exercise yard for longer periods of time. He would lie down in the shade and enjoy the fresh air and change of scene. After a few months, with the help of the staff, he happily climbed into a car to go for a ride to the vet office. The vet was pleasantly surprised to see how great he looked. He was weighed and had lost 34 pounds! He went from 142 to 108 pounds!

With each day Wilford began to get better and better, more active and mobile. One of the staff members was even able to get him to jog through the yard after her. At this time, Wilford moved into a foster home with one of the shelter staff members. Wilford uses the doggy door to go outside and walks down deck stairs to reach the backyard. His foster mom became so attached to Wilford that she decided to adopt him. She takes him to a friend's house on visits where there are horses, cows and goats. Once out of the truck, Wilford jogs over to greet his farm animal pals and tries to herd them. It is quite a sight! He remains on a modified diet in order to continue to lose more weight until he reaches his goal weight of 65 pounds. He now weighs 98 pounds. Wilford has found his Forever Home with just the right person! He is a very happy dog nowadays.

Did You Know?

In 2009 434 cats and dogs arrived at CASA. We are proud that so many of these animals were either returned to their owners or found other loving homes.

Cat Stats: The vast majority of cats and kittens were brought in as strays (or born at the shelter). Of all of the cats, 88% have already found homes while others are waiting to be adopted (either at the shelter or at foster homes).

Dog Stats: Dogs brought to the shelter by the Animal Control Officers are called "impounds". Percentage-wise, more dogs were surrendered by their owners than cats. (30% of the dogs versus 20% of the cats). Fortunately 54% of the dogs were returned to their owners and 42% found other homes.

There is NO TIME LIMIT for an animal at CASA. In fact, some of our animals have been at the shelter since July 2009. Kittens often have a high mortality rate and sometimes die in foster care or have to be put to sleep if they are very sick and suffering. Dogs are only put to sleep if they are terminally ill or too aggressive to be adopted. CASA averaged 49 animals a day either at the shelter or in foster care. As of the end of December, there were 16 animals waiting adoption. Keeping animals at a shelter often increases their stress, but at CASA the cats roam free and dogs are allowed to play outside with "yard buddies" and then rotated into the main office for socialization. Thanks to the loving care of staff and volunteers, these long-term residents remain happy and enthusiastic while waiting for their new Forever Homes.

HOW TO HELP CASA



VOLUNTEER WITH THE ANIMALS

Dog Walkers: Dog walking provides important mental stimulation for our dogs and great exercise for volunteers. If you have an hour or two each week to share, come

Dog Socializers: Spend quality time with adoptable dogs who may be finding shelter life stressful. Dog socializers will spend time just sitting with a dog, encouraging him/her to be calm in the presence of people.

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Morning Cleaner: Assist the shelter staff with the morning cleaning of the cat room, main office and laundry area. This position involves sweeping, mopping, doing dishes and laundry. Extra time allows for petting, brushing and playing.

Cat Socializer: Time spent with people enhances a cat's life and adoptability. Spend time with the cats and talk to potential adopters about the special characteristics of the cats.

Foster Care: All kittens and cats that need special attention and care are placed in foster homes. Foster homes provide a quiet place to rest and learn more about home living. Foster homes are also needed for small dogs. Training materials, veterinary care and food are provided. We are in dire need of foster homes. Toby, Our Thanksgiving Blessing

Thanksgiving has been a bittersweet holiday for a few years. We lost Bo, our old lab mix, the day before Thanksgiving three

years ago. This year we spent Thanksgiving on Camano Island with family and friends. On our way that day we passed the CASA shelter. We returned the next day and spoke to a CASA staff member and visited a few dogs. One was too frightened, one too strong, and one too wound up. We were just about to leave when my husband spotted one more dog. "What about him? He's older, calmer, and handsome". We played and snuggled with him and when he put his paws on us we melted. We were goners! It was Toby, then known as "Kansas". I knew right away he would be ours forever. But we decided to think it over and eventually we left. I did not get much sleep that night. We knew Toby had been there for a long time and just could not figure out why. He was so great! We spoke about adopting an 8

year old dog. We couldn't come up with a single reason not to adopt him. After all, my husband was older, greyer, and calmer too – they were just alike. It was a good fit. We knew we would not have him for those extra 8 years but that was OK. We felt we were a great match for him. Maybe he would calm down our Border Collie, Daizy. We returned the next day with Daizy to see if she and Toby would fit. What a fit it was - for all four of us! He came home with us that day. He came into CASA a stray, so they named him Kansas but we decided to call him Toby.

Toby has been a wonderful treasure for our family. He and Daizy share almost everything. Toby now has a small ranch to romp around and play. He helps feed the horses and snuggles down into a deep sleep each night in my husband's arms! We have only had him a few months but it feels like he has been here forever. How do you explain to anyone that "There is no love like dog love?" I believe that our old dog Bo sent us to CASA on Thanksgiving and had a plan for Toby to be with us forever. When Katie came home with us she needed more medical attention than originally anticipated (eye drops were anticipated). Soon after adoption she had nine teeth removed! Boy, she was not thrilled with that! Every day we gave her ear antibiotic ointment, oral antibiotics, painkillers, eye drops, and synthetic tear ointment. It made for a long morning routine...

Since then, Katie is down to just her eye drops and synthetic tears. We also found her allergic to odd things and she has been put on a special diet. She's not disappointed with that though, as it eliminates grains from her diet...which she wasn't too happy about eating in the first place!



- 1. Cats respond most readily to names that end in an "ee" sound.
- 2. Cats spend nearly 30% of their lives grooming themselves.
- 3. Cats sleep ~13 to 16 hours a day.
- 4. A cat can jump five times as high as its tail.
- 5. Cats purr when content, but also will purr when stressed, fearful, or in pain to comfort themselves. Mother cats will often purr when in labor or when nursing their kittens.
- 6. Cats are carnivores and need meat in their diet. They also need taurine; without it, cats will go blind.
- 7. Calicos and tortoiseshell cats are always female.
- 70% of orange tabby cats are male.
- 9. Cats have AB blood groups, just like people.
- Catnip is a mild nerve stimulant. Its odor, not its taste,

- produces a feline "high". A cat must possess a specific gene to be affected by catnip and 20% of cats do not have this
- 11. Cats have ~100 different vocalizations compared with a dog's ten vocalizations.
- Cats can only sweat from their paw pads.
- To drink, a cat laps liquid from the underside of its tongue, rather than the top.
- Cats have an organ called the vomeronasalorgan, also know as the Jacobson's Organ. This organ seems to play a large part in a cat's sense of smell. It is located inside the mouth. just behind the front teeth, and is connected to the nasal cavity. When a cat brings air into the Jacobson's Organ he may look like he is smiling or grimacing.
- 15. A cat's sense of smell is 14 time stronger than a human's.
